events - A Year in Review



EFM's Community Education Events (formerly known as 'Lecture Series'), were an outstanding success this year with important and compelling topics, impactful speakers, and 100+ registrants for every event!

EFM's goal for 2018-2019 Community Education Events was to provide broader offerings of community learning opportunities to reach more people with films, lectures, and field trips.

Films: We co-hosted two environmental films: *Rebels with a Cause* with the City of Novato and *Wasted: The Story of Food Waste* with Sustainable Fairfax. The Rebels filmmakers, Nancy Kelly and Kenji Yamamoto, gave a short talk and answered questions following the screening.

Lectures: Last November, renowned author Arlie Hochschild presented her book, "Strangers in Their Own Land: Anger and Mourning on the American Right" to a packed house at Corte Madera Community Center. Between January and April, EFM presented a four-part series on *Innovation in Climate Protection*. Programs and speakers addressed innovative solutions for climate change mitigation and adaptation. Topics included Biomimicry and nature-based solutions, the built environment and embodied carbon emissions, carbon sequestration technologies and approaches, and federal climate policy.

Knowledgeable speakers from across the Bay Area, as well as Congressman Jared Huffman, contributed to these compelling programs. Attendance at all events was the highest in EFM's history with more than 500 people attending an EFM Community Education Event.

Field Trips: For the first time, EFM opened its signature West Marin field trip to non-Master Class students. Seven participants attending the Global Climate Action Summit in September joined the Master Class for a day in West Marin. The guests

Continuing the Conversation

The Potential of Intergenerational Collaboration to Solve the Climate Crisis



Over the past several months, I have engaged in four events during which members of the younger and older generations explored the following questions: 1) What might the generations accomplish together that they could not accomplish by themselves? 2) What are the barriers to overcome for intergenerational collaboration to be effective? and 3) What are some of the ways these barriers can be overcome?

The recent actions by young climate activists around the world, such as Greta Thunberg of Sweden and her Schools Strike for Climate Action Movement, the Sunrise Movement, the Extinction Rebellion and Our Children's Trust, are building a major worldwide movement that is sorely needed to wake up those in power, or as the recent Climate One program coined it "If You Won't, We Will!" This is indeed the time for the elders to step forward and support these young activists. As one younger person at an event said: "We don't want you in front of us, we don't want you behind us, we want you beside us." 


