Martin Luther King, Jr. said "there can be no justice without peace and there can be no peace without justice". Lately it seems as though we are reliving the 60's, but something about this time seems different. We can only hope that the seeds of real change are being sown now and will bring us to a better, more just, and peaceful world.

The current crises of the pandemic, economic collapse, systemic racism, and climate change challenge us as never before. The impacts of institutional prejudice, poverty, and environmental injustice disproportionately affect underserved communities. It is now more important than ever that we address the issues surrounding environmental justice and equity. At EFM we are committed to examining the ways in which our programs should be made available to more diverse communities.

Within the challenges of the pandemic the opportunity has emerged for us to make our programs more accessible. We have decided we will not be offering the Master Class in the usual format this fall. Instead we are creating a series of online sessions available to members and the public. Each session will feature one or more presentations by local experts, and will also include suggested related reading and resources. We are excited by the possibility that presenting our programs in a virtual setting may remove some barriers to participation. We are committed to helping people from underserved communities develop their advocacy skills so that they may be effective change agents for their communities.

For almost 50 years EFM has trained advocates for the environment to make a difference in their communities, in Marin and beyond. So much has changed in a short period of time, but we still remain focused on our mission to educate for a sustainable world. Going forward, we will continue to deliver on our mission with the understanding that the challenges before us will make us stronger, more flexible, and more compassionate as an organization.

This past week EFM held its first ever online Annual Meeting using Zoom. It was very successful, with added breakout rooms for more intimate discussion. At the meeting we said goodbye with many thanks to four retiring board members: Nancy Benjamin, Sarah Loughran, Helene Marsh, and Bruce Richard. EFM cannot

Recap: EFM Annual Meeting June 3, 2020 via ZOOM


EFM members gathered virtually Wednesday, June 3 for the Annual Meeting, in compliance with the COVID-19 guidelines. Following <u>business updates</u> and a vote of approval for oncoming Board members, members went into Zoom breakout rooms. Our Director of Education Karen Mendelson-Nelson, wanted to provide members the opportunity to interact with one another, similar to an in-person meeting. Breakrooms had 6-8 members, some with a moderator. A question was presented to guide discussion: what environmental solutions for resilience and sustainability highlight the interrelatedness between the COVID-19 Pandemic and Climate Change? Ideas that were shared when the whole group came together:

- incentivizing tele-commuting, electrifying transportation: our recent clear skies with less traffic were mentioned frequently and the relationship between health and reduction in asthma was noted
- supporting youth involvement as a motivator for optimism
- Recognizing that now is a time for real action, even though we are sheltered-in-place
- the need for food security, eating more plant-based healthy foods, and community-centered microgrids for health centers when there are emergencies, including heat waves, flooding, and fires

Vicki Rupp, former EFM President, now living in Minneapolis, was able to join because of the virtual setting. "Overall a virtual annual meeting worked well and has real potential. It was nice to see so many familiar faces" (note for future planning: introductions using name and MC # were done in some rooms, but not all). Breakroom discussions? "The breakout room was a good idea but the transition was confusing. Our group seemed a little flummoxed by the question, potentially this could have been an opportunity for more social interaction." The EFM Board is on a steep learning curve, and welcomes any feedback.

Going forward, **FORUM 2020** will replace this year's Master Class, taking advantage of the virtual environment for learning. Time-crunched? You will be able to sign up for individual sessions and do pre-class work on your time-frame. "In-Person" sessions will still be virtual because of COVID-19, but regardless of where you live, your demographics, you will be able to participate. We would like to encourage students, working parents, individuals involved with other environmental agencies (government, non-profits, education) take this opportunity to learn. The Annual Meeting was our first step of more to come in the virtual environment.

MC 41 Graduate Gives Back During Pandemic

During deeply troubling times, it's an inability to do anything to help that weighs us down most. My husband Tom and I started talking about how we could make a difference.

Tom becam anline receased about whether we could construct medical face chiefly

to preserve those masks and keep our medics safer.

We found websites with full instructions and tips about materials suppliers. Tom started ordering and 3 weeks later obtained enough plastic, foam and elastic to begin prototyping and our kitchen-table production was in full swing.

As of the end of May, we've delivered 250 face shields, to the brave front-line medical workers who are risking their safety for the rest of us.

Addendum

EFM reported in our spring newsletter "that fiber (paper) is no longer being recycled at all. Paper is sitting in the collection areas because it is usually shipped to China, and the coronavirus is not allowing shipping." While there was a brief halting of anything shipped to Asia (China no longer handles the vast majority of our recyclables), it has resumed.

Justin Wilcock from Marin Sanitary confirmed shipping resumed after a few weeks, and the ports have remained operational.

Chrise de Tournay, a Zero Waste specialist and educator, EFM graduate and former board member, reminds everyone that fiber and mixed paper are absolutely being recycled and to keep doing it!
