# Recapping recent Forum 2021 events: "Decarbonization" and "Empty Trash Bins"

Pathways to Decarbonization: How we can get from here to there

Decarbonization is the journey to reposition ourselves away from fossil fuels to alternative fuels with net negative emissions. EFM partnered with Marin Conservation League for a February 2021 virtual event that presented the themes we considered important to share with our community.

Saul Griffith, visionary MacArthur fellow, enthusiastically spoke about his scientifically-mapped concept solutions to reach negative emissions providing a positive image for the future. Vicken Kasarjian, also presented about our local non-profit electric aggregator, MCE.

Kate Sears, our dedicated-just retired Marin County Supervisor, moderated a deep conversation with Saul and Vicken, discussing the ecosystem that will lead to consumer behavioral change within the largest greenhouse gas emissions categories, Transportation 52% and Residential Energy 22%, generated principally by households.



# How and why to choose sustainable consumption over wasteful consumerism



- how we handle waste in Marin
- how we can make adjustments to our lifestyles to avoid generating so much waste in the first place.



We welcomed **Kimberly Scheibly,** an independent consultant helping waste industry companies, for a fact-filled dumpster dive. We emerged having learned the sobering truth: **recycling is not the answer**. Whether it's because we're confused, indifferent, or lack opportunity, most of us just don't consistently provide haulers with clean well-sorted material. Even if everyone did, recycling is at best an energy-intensive business that often makes no sense economically. Less than 10% of plastic is recycled.

Once we crawled out of that dumpster and faced the facts, it was time for fun. **Lily Cameron**, owner of the <u>Wild Minimalist</u> and author "Simply Sustainable," talked about her own family's journey to a zero-waste lifestyle. She offered advice on stopping waste before it starts, providing us all with a vision of a reduced-clutter life that could also reduce the burden on the environment.

We always have more questions than time to answer them during our webinars, so for this event, for the first time, we had a noon hour follow-up discussion the next day. Waste expert **Christienne de Tournay-Birkhann (MC 35)** answered questions and facilitated discussion. We look forward to adding next-day follow-up calls to other events in the future — it was a great opportunity both to learn more and to build community.


We are particularly interested in schools; it's important that climate change information be available to those who will inherit our planet. Additional webinars on climate change are available on the EFM website, and can be translated.



## **Keeping up with MC graduates:**

## Giving back to our communities in many ways

**Terri Thomas (MC 43)**: providing monthly updates from Environmental Roundtable

Terri Thomas, our Director of Ecology, represents EFM at the **Marin County Parks and Open Spaces Environmental Roundtable**. Environmental groups

provides MCPOSD with information to make projects more ecologically beneficial, prior to the projects going to the public for review. Briefings on biodiversity monitoring of everything from bats and badgers to frogs and monarchs are shared, as well as identifying current rare plant and bird locations.

Recent projects reviewed by the Environmental Roundtable have included Cascad Canyon Bridge Replacement, Stafford Lake Pump Track planning, Ring Mountain Trails, goat grazing areas, and areas where pile burning occurs. Vegetation management is now a focus because fuels reduction funding from Measure C has created the need to understand how best to retain Marin's ecological values while reducing wildfire risk.
